On January 17th we will discuss “The Beautiful Mystery” by Louise Penny.

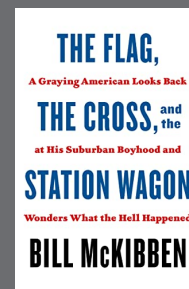
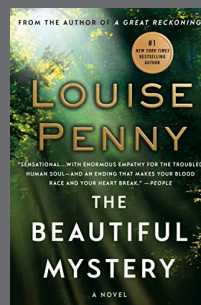

BAD LUCK & TROUBLE MEET LOVING PRESENCE

It's Friday the Thirteenth.

Covid has struck everyone but me in the office. My dryer decided to break — which is thankfully more the landlord's problem than mine, but tell that to the clothes I have sitting in the washing machine! This seems pretty on brand!

While Covid is frustrating, fortunately the office people are doing okay. The dryer is frustrating, but it's not going to cause our lives to grind to a halt. Even so, I'm reminded that there are moments when the little things stack up, seeming to join the big things in the worry queue.

I spoke to a person this morning who doesn't belong to our congregation who told me his daughter was scared of what might happen to her at school. He told me she was scared of there being a shooter, of being a victim, of being helpless. Being a lawyer, he immediately moved into defend and protect mode. "Well, you have to fight! You have a duty to retreat, but if you've exhausted all other options, you have to fight." Listening to him telling the story, I realized that this is his vocation in his mind — fighting to defend people is what he does. He didn't sound like the kind of person who often retreats. It was a fascinating turn from what our culture often likes to think of lawyers and their ethics. He told me his spouse told their daughter that she needs to pray, and being a Muslim family, this makes sense.

"Trust God" meets "trust your fists".

I spoke with another person outside of our congregation whose child has a mysterious mass, and while it's too early to know anything for certain, all the wheels are turning. They're worried about their child, their family, their other kids, their spouse. "What about my job?" I get it. Life has a nasty habit of interfering with our plans, no matter how carefully we prepare. I offered the consolation of sitting in their worry, grief, and pain. I offered the only assurance I believe I can offer with any integrity: faith doesn't mean that bad things won't happen, and it definitely doesn't stop life from being stressful. God's promise is to become flesh when we're weeping, and while I don't know that it necessarily fixes anything, knowing someone loves me enough to stay when I'm grieving helps me feel less alone. Jesus promises to sit with us and to be present.

"I will be with you always, even until the end of the age" meets "I can't even get myself under control".

Isn't that the real kicker?

If I had my preference, I'd say that God should fix my issues. I'd say that it's not fair about my dryer, about the fear of a student for their safety, about the fear of a parent for their child.

"Trust God to be with you always" meets "I trust my fists, but I can't even get myself under control".

Somewhere there's a joke about Bad Luck & Trouble and Loving Presence bumping into each other, and Bad Luck & Trouble saying, "We've gotta quit bumping into each other like this!". At least that's how it works in my head. I meet trouble with humor, and I ridicule what scares my soul because it makes me feel more capable of overcoming it if I can laugh at it. I laughed when I flipped a truck out on a rural highway in South Carolina after I realized I wasn't injured. I was grateful, but a little bit indignant that such a dramatic event left me unscathed save for some soreness the next few days. I laughed at my infected finger when I realized I'd need a fourth surgery on a wound I inflicted with a butter knife.

I didn't laugh the one time my daughter had a fever so high we wondered whether we should take her to the hospital. That was too real, too close, too deep. I did laugh a little at myself for being so beside myself, but it was mirthless. My capacity to ridicule what frightens me sobers up fast when it's my family.

That evening, I remember that there wasn't a lot said in the house, but we sat for awhile in the quiet. Maybe we talked or joked. I'm positive we discussed whether or not to take her to the hospital several times, but we knew we'd made the decision not to. The conversation was an exercise in presence, in love, in caring for ourselves and each other. It was the mutual checking in to see if we were still as helpless as we feared.

It was "I'm so glad I'm not alone in here" meets "I'm so glad I'm not alone in here".

That's the Gospel.

That's it.

Happy, sad; joyful or joking; wounded or healed — I'm glad I'm not alone in here because this is what God enfleshed means at its core. We may not get the easy road we wish we had, but thanks be to God that we're not alone in here.

Exploring Baptism

In Sunday School, we began 2023 thinking about Baptism. Families shared stories of our students' baptisms, and we compared them to Jesus' baptism. Some of us learned what we might experience when we are baptized.

We recognized that water was an important component of both Jesus' baptism and our baptisms! And, of course, the Holy Spirit was present! And friends and family were likely there too.

We found that Jesus' baptism was different from ours. He was an adult, and we were baptized as babies or young children. And none of us were baptized in a river like Jesus was.

We explored different water stations like musical water, ocean in a bottle, pouring water, and will it float? And we enjoyed painting our own shells like the kind that is often used in baptism.

And we realized that while water is what we think of first when we think about baptism, what makes Baptism special is the Holy Spirit!



Sharing Christmas Cheer with Cambridge's Outdoor Church

What were you doing 3 days before Christmas? Last minute shopping? Desperately wrapping gifts? Baking Christmas cookies?

Well, on the afternoon of December 22nd, youth from St John and Sudbury United Methodist Church (SUMC) were distributing Christmas cookies—and lunches—to street-dependent folks in Harvard and Central Squares in conjunction with Cambridge's Outdoor Church.



It was kind of a gray day, but Christmas cheer was in the air as we shared the lunches of turkey, ham or peanut butter and jelly sandwiches, chips, fruit, and cookies.

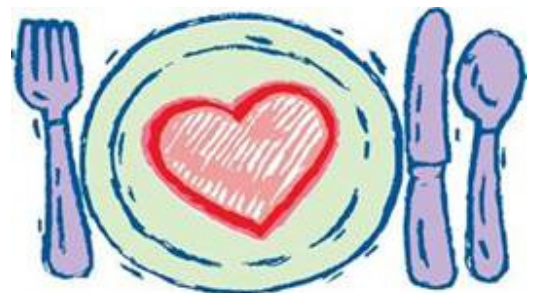

We are grateful to the St John members as well as folks from SUMC and the Presbyterian Church in Sudbury who regularly provide items for up to 120 bagged lunches for Outdoor Church parishioners. And we were thrilled to share all of the adult items that decorated our St John Mitten Tree with Cambridge's street dependent folks.

The “Sudbury Contingent” distributes lunches with the Outdoor Church on the 4th Saturday of each month—or when a holiday challenges that, we distribute on Thursdays. We provide sandwiches, chips, cookies, and fruit as well as water and muffins. And we provide the people power to share the lunches in Cambridge. 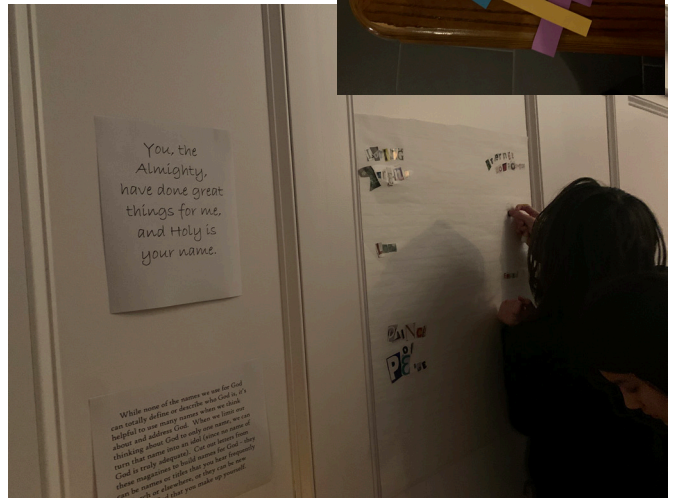

Thank you to everyone helped with the program from the teachers, pianists, sound team, singers, and actors! You were all wonderful!

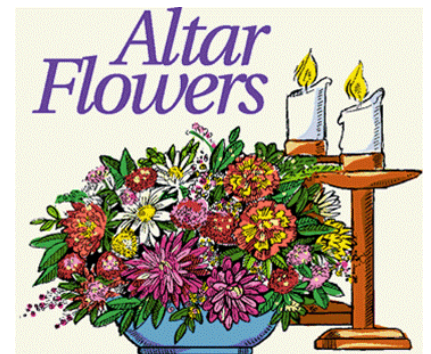
ALTAR FLOWERS
