30 KITCHEN KITS FOR ACTON’S HOUSEHOLD GOODS, INC.!

This past Sunday there were piles of potholders, dishcloths, paring knives, and spoons covering the tables when confirmation students arrived for their first in-person class in over a year. Under the guidance of Karen LaCure and Valerie Ripley, students filled 30 2-gallon ziplock bags with the kitchen utensils that Household Goods considers essential to every home—that was over 600 items! The kitchen utensil kits are given to each client setting up a new kitchen and include such items as measuring cups and spoons, big spoons, vegetable peelers, and tongs.

Household Goods, Inc. provides a full range of donated furniture and household items, free of charge, to help people in need make a home. Each year, Household Goods furnishes over 2,500 homes with 60,000 pieces of furniture and smaller household items. Many of the people who need Household Goods are recently homeless, veterans, survivors of domestic violence, low income, immigrants, victims of disaster, or are coping with illness or disability. They are referred to Household Goods by one of hundreds of social services agencies in Massachusetts.

THOSE PEOPLE

I'm not a "here's my blog" kind of guy. I find it annoying and patronizing for pastors to say "here's my blog!" in official communications in the congregation because it usually is just a means of self-aggrandizement and representative of their sense of self-importance.

So "here's my blog"! My current series, Reflections on Love, can be found at loveseescolor.com.

I began this blog back in 2015 following the martyrdom and murder of the Emanuel 9 with a friend from college with whom I've collaborated some over the years and who is African American. My tongue-in-cheek pen name and social media handle, ericthelutheran, came to be when he and I knew a guy named John, who was Baptist, and who we nicknamed (wait for it) John the Baptist. Though Eric the Lutheran (and now ericthelutheran) began as a joke, I guess I've now officially adopted it through an organic process. I mean, why let John the Baptist and Symeon the New Theologian have all the fun, right?

This collaboration didn't take off like I'd hoped, but I've maintained the blog and web domain over the years as a means of memorializing that moment in time following June 17, 2015 because of how drastically it changed my life.

Reflections on Love is a series addressing the problems we face as Christians talking about the LGBTQIA+ community, and will be a mix of narrative theology and straight theology exploring how to apply the rich traditions of the Christian faith to faithfully say that there's no unique sin present in these relationships or identities. What's interesting (to me) is that the deeper I dive into the whole issue of inclusion theologically, the more I realize that our real hurdle isn't a theological one, but a cultural one.

Those people are a group I often use as a stand in for whatever issue we're talking about. *Those people* look different, smell different, vote different, live different, aren't from around here, love different, eat different, worship and believe different, exist differently than we're used to in "polite society". Those people are just trying to get us to change everything and can't leave well enough alone because they don't have a sense of humor to get the jokes we tell and the reasons we keep them out.

Those People is kind of my litmus test to figure out whether my own feelings about someone or something are fair or unfair. For instance, I have a friend going through a divorce right now and over the time that I've known about it, I've noticed that I get judgey about their situation even though I have no idea what it is. It's really rare for me to feel this way about divorce, and it bugged me. First I confessed it to my bride so we could talk it through and so I could hear out loud what I knew, that I was being ridiculous. Second, I spent some time processing it, replacing their name with *those people*.

"*Those people* are getting divorced and it's making me frustrated because I thought their marriage would last. Well, I guess so did they.

"*Those people* have been together for a long time, and I can't believe they're just throwing away all that time and effort and energy. Well, I bet they can't believe it either, but at some point some couples find themselves at an impasse that they can't resolve together, only apart."

Those people, it turns out in this case, wasn't my feelings about my friend at all, rather it was me projecting my own fears and insecurities onto them. We've been married twenty years now, and while I have no legitimate fear or expectation that this will change, of course it's a scary thought that we may one day reach an impasse. It's scary to think about a time when my deepest partnership could become an enmity or ambivalent.

Encountering this divorce with my judgemental heart was me encountering myself and recognizing the ways that I could be a better spouse, and the grief of having to reclassify these people in my mind as separate human beings rather than a single unit.

The problem wasn't them after all, it was me because I hadn't been able to recognize my own issues with their situation. It's not rational, but it's very human.

When I think about my own racism, LGBTQIA+ hatred, anti-Asian, antisemitism, or any of the rest of it, it all boils down to my own unreasonable expectation that the world reorganize to make me more comfortable. I get mad at *those people* because in order to love them — as Jesus commands me to do — I have to see them for who they are and love them where they are. I can't be colorblind or cultureblind or any of the rest of it because to erase those parts of these people is to erase these important parts of their identity.

Love sees color, because color is part of the person we love. When we try to force someone else into our own box, that's not love but control. When we expand our own box so they can occupy their own space in our world, we share with them and with us the love of Jesus.

Those people. Who are they for you? What can you do today to transform *them* into *us*?

Alyssa Barilone graduated from Maynard High School and will be attending Northeastern University in their Explore Program (undeclared major).




Collin Heye graduated from Lincoln-Sudbury High School and will be attending Champlain College to study Cybersecurity.
