


AN UNKNOWN FREEDOM

They were in a garden where they'd been created; told they were created to tend to the garden and enjoy all it offered. They could eat whatever they wanted except for the fruits of the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil.

They were listening to their father go on about building an ark — an ark? An ark, because the world was going to flood. An ark, because their lives would be preserved as the world perished. An ark, that after long days and nights with animals and family, and rain rain rain rain rain, the dove returned with a branch. They walked out onto dry land to a world cleansed, nothing but possibilities ahead.

They cried out for freedom from slavery in Egypt, and the Lord was their salvation. Through a sea that parted for the children of Abraham but crashed down upon the army of a hardened-hearted pharaoh, they were delivered into an unknown freedom.

Freedom is one of the core themes of the Bible, and at its center is God, who desires for creation to have a sense of freedom; and we — from our very start — have no clue how to use it well or wisely.

We eat the fruit.

We do evil things shortly after we leave the ark even though we built the altar first.

We cry out for freedom and then long for our bondage when freedom becomes too expansive, too big, too scary — too real.

For months we wore masks and longed for freedom. We got a taste and are going back into more strict precautions. We still long for freedom in a world where we have nothing *but* choices.

Isn't that such a strange thing?

There are some real limits on how we can do things in order to protect ourselves and others, but there is literally no substantive limit on the number of choices we have outside of that. But despite the nearly endless array of options inside of these few limitations, I *feel* that the walls are kind of closing in because I'm weary of another shutdown, wary of the judgment of a population sick of being told what to do — and give-a-darn wizened by prolonged hypervigilance.

This is the real dilemma I find myself facing right now: I love this congregation and we will act responsibly out of love for each other, our community, and in service to the calling of God; and I love this congregation and we need to live life like a congregation out of love for each other, our community, and in service to the calling of God.

In Christ there is freedom because the law of Christ is the law of love, and if we follow the law of love then we can do what we want because love fulfills the law. And that's really the trick, isn't it?

What ****I**** want is different than what my love for others tells me to want. I want to do what I want, and yet my love for others tells me to want what's best for others. So despite what I want, I want to see what's good for all of us.

All that to say this:

We are the body of Christ, called to love the world around us. We have a lot to do, yet the last year-and-a-half has been a whole host of moving targets, expectations, and possibilities. We have a Gospel calling to do the hard work of being the Church in this strange and challenging time.

Over the next couple months, that's what we're going to learn to do: be the Church in its fullest expression given the circumstances we're experiencing now. I believe there are several questions we're being called to ask in this moment:

- Who is God calling us to be in this moment?
- When I think about the ministries I'm involved with, what does "normal" look like right now? What is outreach? What is member care? What is worship?
- What will help us be both on the right side of caution *and* live in a more normal way as the Church?

Friends, I tell you this with love: this is not a moment to sit still. When the world is in turmoil, the Church is a bulwark because the Lord is our bulwark; the Church is our strength because the Lord is our strength.

All we have to do is be who we are, follow God's calling and our vocation, and live the law of love.

None of us can do this alone, but none of us need to. We are the Church. With the love of God as the wind at our backs, we've got this.
